Fun Horse Facts & Interesting Breeds

The Gypsy Vanner Horse - shown above pulling a Vardo, a traditional wagon that has been used by British Romani (Gypsy) people as their home since 1850. Although it looks and sounds like a very old and well-established breed, Gypsy Vanner horses were only recognized as a distinct breed in 1996, when Dennis & Cindy Thompson created the Gypsy Vanner Horse Society (GVHS). The GVHS is the world's first registry to recognize a breed of horse developed by the Gypsies of Great Britain/Ireland and the only such registry founded on an in depth study of British/Irish Gypsies and their horses. As wildly improbable as it seemed, their research confirmed that one of the most magnificent breeds of horse the world has ever seen was not recognized, did not have a name, and was not understood outside the world of the Gypsies. The Gypsies created this breed from a variety of English and Irish breeds such as the Cob Horse, Dales Pony, and even larger draft horses like Shires and Clydesdales.

The great covered riding facility pictured on the front page started back in 2014, when representatives from Rockbrook Camp and Free Rein Center got together to dream, put their dreams on paper, and turn those dreams into a goal. Jeff and Sarah Carter, owners of Rockbrook Camp, turned the goal into a plan and Richie Case and his crews made the plan a reality. Dreams really can come true.

This is exciting on many levels. Children with autism do not deal well with changes to their schedules and routines, so not having to cancel classes due to rain will help us serve them better. It will give us the opportunity to offer evening classes and add new programs for different individuals and groups and maybe even add a few weeks to the length of our sessions. These possible changes will not happen this fall, as we all get used to the new facility. We'll keep you posted.

Rockbrook Camp started using the new facility this summer for their camp ses-

sions. Our riders will start using it in September, when our fall session begins. We're all very excited about this new page in our history.

No big changes are in store for this fall session, though, as we get used to the new facility and plan for best using it. While the new facility brings many exciting opportunities, it will also bring a challenge, in the form of increased monthly rent we pay to Rockbrook Camp. That's a



Cameron has faced more physical and developmental challenges than any child should ever have to face, including a stroke when he was only two years old, Autism, and low muscle tone. He started riding at Free Rein Center in 2014, after his Mom (Jodi) heard about our programs from

one of our volunteers in her Jazzercise class (our thanks to that person for representing Free Rein Center so well!). The volunteer told her that therapeutic riding might be a good thing for Cameron.

Jodi couldn't agree more, saying "He has an extreme love for animals and what better way to build his muscle and his confidence than putting him on a horse and letting him just be a 'normal' kid. Cameron loves all the activities but his most favorite is just being able to hug his favorite horse, Danny."

She went on to say, "Since Cameron started riding I can tell a difference in him not being as shy and being more confident in who he is. He has built

more muscle and can actually keep his weight off the seat when trotting which was a huge challenge for him in the beginning."

Iodi mentioned that. "Cameron was disappointed recently when Danny couldn't be ridden due to asthma. He loved his new horse Buddy but really did miss Danny. The last day of the session Cameron wanted to say goodbye to Danny in the pasture. He yelled Danny's name and to our surprise, Danny came trotting over to allow Cameron to scratch him and nudged Cameron as if to say

goodbye. Cameron was super excited and the smile on his face said a thousands words. He told people that story for days. Free Rein Center is not just Horse Back Riding therapy to my family. It has been an amazing journey to watch our child grow and learn more about himself than we would have ever thought he could before he got into this program."

So What P

We who are immersed in the mission of our organization get to see the real impacts of what we do up close and personal. We often tell our donors and supporters a lot of **what** we do and fail to adequately convey the "so what". We have many anecdotal stories, like:

- an 8-year-old child with autism who asks his mother, "where are the horses" one morning on the way to our barn when she had only ever heard him say, "Momma."
- an adult with MS who had to use a wheelchair to get around, but started using a walker after only 3 months of weekly riding increased her core strength & balance
- a mother who said the first time she ever saw her daughter acknowledge another person was in one of our classes

We are doing two things to improve our ability to better understand and convey the "so what" in the near future. First, we are conducting scholarly research on the rapeutic riding's outcomes for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities with the help of Dr. Michael Solomon. Second, we are rolling out a new tool to assess progress and impact made during the course of a session, which will give us deeper insight into what therapeutic riding means for our students and their families.

Welcome, New **Board Member**


