Spring 2022


The week of April 10, 2022, kicked off our Spring Session consisting of one, six-week session, totaling 93 participants and an additional four-week session, with 26 participants. These sessions allowed for the development of new programming and the accommodation of participants on the existing waiting list. The first Spring session welcomed back the exceptional children school groups, groomers, ground activities, and individual riders. Following our interruption of the

The program focuses on horse behavior and herd dynamics, proper horse interaction, and equine care. Project Odyssey also provides opportunities to participate in team building activities through the interaction with horses.

Community Outreach – PROJECT ODYSSEY 2022

Free Rein partnered with Project Odyssey®, a 12-week mental health program that uses adventure-based learning to help warriors manage and overcome their invisible wounds, enhance their resiliency skills, and empower them to live productive and fulfilling lives. Based on their unique needs, warriors can participate in an all-male, all-female, or couples Project Odyssey. This spring, Free Rein facilitated members' therapeutic experiences with horses. The following are some of the comments from these participants.

What was the biggest thing you learned from today's session?

- I learned that horses are the gentle powers of the planet.
- To stay in the horse's line of sight.
- Horses are like people, if they are loved and nurtured they will show basic love and obedience with one
 exception, people are evil and horses are not.
- Telling someone what to do is not as easy as it seems.
- Sometime the horses just need a second before they're ready to perform, just like people like us when we anxious/overwhelmed, etc.
- To trust the horse.
- We have to trust and believe.
- That horses are loving animals, they mimic how we feel - if you're comfortable, they're comfortable.
- To be firm but gentle.
- Don't need the horse's name to get its attention.
- How working in a calm manner effects how you maneuver the horse.
- To stay calm, talk softly, be present with the horse.

Olaf


Breed: Norwegian Fjord


Age: 14

Financial Reports - 2022 Mid-Year Report

This year due to effective decisions, Free Rein has maintained expenses to the prior year level. However, we have seen and anticipate further increases in the cost of horse care (hay, grain, shavings and supplements).


Our personnel expenses have increased because Free Rein's program attendance has expanded. This, in turn, increases the need for instructor hours.

At this time, Free Rein is operating at capacity. Costs also reflect that the majority of our clients are attending through scholarships. Free Rein will not turn down a client for economic reasons and will work with the client through a sliding scale mechanism.

Free Rein will continue to monitor costs, make effective economic decisions, and gratefully accept donations from our loyal donors and sponsors.


How You Can Help Free Rein
